Your best bet is to check the 'News & Events' page of our website **unityha.co.uk** which is updated regularly.



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Grow Your Own Fruit & Vegetables



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Cheapest

See how much you could save!

A packet of seeds could cost as little as £1 and if nurtured properly, could reward you with a bumper crop of fruit or vegetables in late summer and early autumn. You can even harvest the seeds from your fruit or vegetables and plant them again next year!

Growing your own fruit and vegetables at home needn't be tricky or expensive – although it can take up a little bit of time. We have produced a handy guide on growing some of the most popular fruit and vegetables at home. For some, you do not even need a garden; just a small outdoor space.

Top tips for growing fruit at home

	Water plants when soil is dry to the touch
2	Make sure that your containers have drainage to avoid waterlogging
3	When stalks become too tall, tie them to a cane with twine to support them
4	Protect plants from frost, and only move them outside after the last frost of the year
5	Protect your plants from pests (always follow manufacturer's instructions)
6	Remove weeds as they will compete with your plants for nutrients in the soil
7	When fruits start to appear, stop the plants from growing ony taller by 'pinching out' growing tips.
8	Pick fruit reaularly to encourage new arowth



Pick truit regularly to encourage new growth

Keep seeds from your fruit and vegetables to plant next year

Exchange seeds with friends and neighbours to get the best variety

In 2015, we found the cheapest places to buy gardening equipment were:

Multi-purpose compost: Aldi, Lidl Small/medium plant pots: Asda Plant trays: Poundland Seed trays: Poundland Plastic tools: Poundland Seeds (type may vary): Poundland Cane and twine: Poundland Liquid feed: Poundland

Broad Bean



Sow: From March Grow: In containers Harvest: Late Summer



Fill small pots with compost up to 4cm from the top



From March, sow one seed per pot and cover with 2cm of compost



When plants are too tall to stand upright on their own, tie them to a cane with twine



When roots begin to show at the bottom of the pot, transplant the plants into larger pots



Move outside in early summer



When beans begin to appear, pinch off the growing tips to encourage the plant to use all of its energy producing beans



When beans are a finger width, harvest them from the bottom up. Keep picking beans to encourage new growth

Tomato

Pepper



Sow: From January Grow: In containers, or in a growing bag Harvest: Late Summer

Fill small pots or a seed tray with compost up to 2cm from the top.



Sow seeds and cover with 1cm of compost

When plants are about 8 weeks old, separate them into new pots. Ensure roots are covered with compost and give the plants plenty of water

When flowers appear, transplant into a growing bag You will need to prepare the growing bag by puncturing some holes in it and kneading it to break up any clumps of compacted compost

When plants become too tall to stand upright tie the plant to a cane with twine.

Encourage growth of fruit by cutting any side shoots

If tomatoes do not redden on the plant, try picking them when they are green and placing them in a draw with a ripe banana



Sow: From January Grow: In containers Harvest: From July



Fill a pot with compost and scatter seeds thinly on the top



Put the pot into a propagator or place a clear plastic bag over the top and secure with an elastic band



Remove the propagator or plastic bag after one week when the shoots have started to appear. Place pot on a window sill



When seedlings are 2cm tall, separate them into their own pots



When roots begin to show through the bottom of the pot, move the plants into bigger pots



When plants are too tall to stand upright on their own, tie them to a cane with twine



Place pots outside at the beginning of summer. Water every day and feed weekly with liquid tomato feed




Harvest fruit between July and September. Pick regularly to encourage new growth

Who will be affected?









Firstly, new claims from single people.

The Government will then phase in new claims for couples and then families

In 2016 they will start all other new claims for example for those who cannot work

When will it start?

It will arrive in Leeds in **DECEMBER 2015.** If you are going to be a affected, **NOW** is the time to prepare for the changes.

What can I do to prepare?

- Get a **BASIC BANK ACCOUNT** if you don't already have one, as you can't be paid Universal Credit without one.
- 2 If you have any outstanding **DEBTS**, **GET HELP NOW** and **REDUCE OR CLEAR ANY RENT ARREARS** as soon as you can.
- 3 SAVE FOR EMERGENCIES. Universal Credit is first paid five weeks after you apply, and you don't want to have no money at that time.
- 4 Get an EMAIL ADDRESS and familiarise yourself with using the INTERNET. Contact Unity's Employment Team on 0113 200 7738 if you could benefit from some free training.
- 5 Can you **BUDGET MONTHLY**? Your benefits will come all at once, each month, and you don't want to run out of money halfway through the month.
- 6 Pay your rent and bills by **STANDING ORDER** or **DIRECT DEBIT** as long as you can avoid going overdrawn. This will help if you are the type of person who forgets which bills to pay and when.

The true cost of domestic violence

What is the definition of domestic violence?

The Government defines domestic violence as 'any incident of threatening behaviour, violence or abuse between adults who are or have been intimate partners or family members.

This includes issues of concern to black and minority ethnic (BME) communities such as 'honour based violence'.

What if you suspect someone is suffering from domestic violence?

If you know or suspect a family member, friend, or work colleague is experiencing domestic violence, your first instinct may be that you want to protect your friend or family member, but intervening can be dangerous for both you and them.

If your friend is open with you and acknowledging the violence, this is a positive sign and an indication that they trust you. Try to keep in touch with them so that they don't become more isolated.

Don't ask them to leave their partner, nor criticise them for staying with their partner - this could put them in more danger. Encourage your friend of family member to seek professional help and to prioritise their safety at all times. You will become a lifeline to your friend or family member.

However, if your case is an emergency, or if you witness an assault, please call the police.

Tony's Top Tips To save yourself a bob or two...

A few pointers to help you fix problems without having to book a repair, keep you safe and save yourself a bit of money too...



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1. Keep your contact details up to date!

If you have changed your mobile number or other contact details let us know! We send contractors to carry out repairs but they can't get access to your property as they are unable to get hold of you!

7. Get involved!

Unity will be tendering the day to day repairs contract. We use Tenant Panel members to assist in selecting a company, however you can be involved too. Please let us know if you wish to be considered.

3. Ants, Wasps, Pests

With summer coming up we anticipate a lot of tenants reporting trouble with wasps, bee's nests and ants. Unfortunately Unity is not able to treat infestations and pests – this is something you need to arrange and pay for yourself. You could try Axial Pest Control -Call Terry on 07957 911030 and ask for a quote.

4. Loss of power? Or a faulty appliance?

If you have lost power to your property, it could be a faulty electrical appliance causing the fuse box to trip. You can test which appliance is causing the problem by unplugging everything, flipping the fuse switch back on and then plugging your

5. Beeping smoke alarm?

Check your battery. Even hard-wired smoke detectors have a battery which serves as a back-up if the mains power fails. If you report a faulty alarm, and we send a reapir person, you will have to pay if the only fault is that the battery needs replacing. appliances back in one at a time. If you do not lose power, it may have been a power surge. If you cannot flip the fuse switch back on, you will need to log a repair.

6. Locate your stop tap!

If you ever suffer a leak, it is important that you know where the stop tap is in your property to cease the flow of water. If you are able to do this, it will hopefully minimise any damage to your property and belongings.
